## COULD COST

The Fashion Police have taken drastic measures to turn the tide on fashion crime as its prevalence continues to grow. The most recent legislation has implemented unprecedented yet completely necessary language to ensure the fashionability of the people:

"No article of clothing covering primarily the torso of the upper body which has a collar about the neck hole may be buttoned, zipped, laced, or otherwise closed in such a way as to cause the non-overhanging portions of the neck collar to become completely joined to each other along the entire length of the non-overhanging section of the collar, defined by the cross-sections of the non-overhanging portions of the collar all being (approximately) closed elliptical shapes, unless the portions of the non-overhanging collar which should be so conjoined are duly covered with a tie, bow-tie, scarf, or other similar neck-wear" (The Fashion Police Act of 3498).

What does this all mean? In short, it means that the buttoning or zipping of collared shirts/jackets all the way to the top is completely prohibited, unless a tie or scarf is also worn. This practice, known colloquially as "omnibutting," especially refers to dress and polo shirts, which may never be buttoned all the way to the top unless accompanied by a tie. The consequences of breaking the Laws of Fashion are grave - Crimes Against Fashion carry the heaviest punishments in the Fashion Law System: arrest, imprisonment, and fines of up to FSH \$50,000, as the law permits. It's simply best not omnibutt in the first place.
